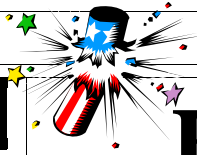

AKC INTRODUCES CONDITIONAL REGISTRATION

This is actually really good news. I can think of some dogs that went out of the gene pool over disputes that might otherwise have made significant contributions. Conditional registration, though long and arduous could be very useful. This sort of thing was done way back in the beginning of purebred dogs.

New York, NY - The American Kennel Club(r) Conditional Registration program is now available for any AKC(r)-registered dog whose parent, through DNA testing, is found to be unidentifiable. Rather than canceling the registrations of the individual dog, all of its littermates and all of their offspring, AKC will change affected dogs' registration to the conditional status.

The conditional status will be clearly noted on the registration or pedigree of the unknown dog, as well

as all progeny for three generations, with the letter Q starting the AKC registration number. Conditional status will only be granted in cases where the dog is believed to be purebred, but a registered parent is found to be incorrect.

"The Conditional Registration program will foster better relationships with dog owners who discover that there is an unidentified ancestor in their purebred dog's pedigree," said Thomas Sharp, Assistant Vice President of Compliance. "Now these owners will not be penalized with a revoked AKC registration and the loss of a majority of its benefits. For example, a dog with Conditional registration may still participate in any event in which ILP dogs may participate, including Obedience, Agility, and Rally."

Conditional registration also offers informed breeders the ability to keep these dogs and their offspring in a breed's gene pool. To register a litter out of a sire and dame with conditional registration, both parents must be DNA-profiled. After three generations of DNA-profiled parents, the registrations will revert to regular for the litter in the fourth generation. This protocol is in line with the acceptance of imported dogs with three generation pedigrees from the country of origin.

From I-25 travel north on Colorado Boulevard to East Virginia Ave. (Sheraton Hotel on SE corner of intersection, Shot Gun Willy's on N.E. Corner of intersection, and Holiday Inn Select on N.W. Corner of intersection) Turn east (Right) on East Virginia Ave. and travel to South Clermont Street turn South (Right) and park along street in marked parking spaces. CANINE HEAT STROKE

SIGNS OF HEAT STROKE

Signs of heat stroke are intense, rapid panting, wide eyes, salivating, staggering and weakness. Advanced heat stroke victims will collapse and become unconscious. The gums will appear pale and dry. If heat stroke is suspected and you can take the animal's temperature rectally, any temperature above 106 degrees is dangerous. The longer the temperature remains at or above 106 degrees the more serious the situation. If you return to your car or the area in which the animal was confined and find your pet seems to be highly agitated, wide-eyed and panting uncontrollably... start for the nearest animal hospital right away with the air conditioning at full blast. Otherwise get the dog to a cool area and begin the treatment for heat stroke.

TREATMENT FOR HEAT STROKE

Take the pet's temperature rectally if possible. A body temperature of about 105 degrees or higher is probable evidence for **heat stroke**. Place your pet in a tub of cool running water or spray with a hose **being sure the cool water contacts the skin and doesn't simply run off the coat**. Thoroughly wet the belly and inside the legs. Run the cool water over the tongue and mouth. Take a rectal temperature if possible to know when to stop cooling. A safe temperature is about 103 degrees. A small dog will cool down much faster than a large dog. Once the temperature gets to 103 or 104 degrees do not cool the pet any further because the cooling effects will continue to bring the temperature down even further. Seek veterinary attention as soon as possible.

If you are near an animal hospital, go there right away. At the animal hospital they may administer oxygen, cortisone and dextrose to help protect the traumatized cells. The staff can provide proper cooling measures and monitor the dog's temperature, heart rate and provide oxygen which some evidence indicates may help protect stressed body cells. Providing intravenous fluids and anticoagulants may be utilized as well.

AKC Code of Sportsmanship

AKC CODE OF SPORTSMANSHIP

PREFACE: The sport of purebred dog competitive events dates prior to 1884, the year of AKC's birth. Shared values of those involved in the sport include principles of sportsmanship. They are practiced in all sectors of our sport: conformation, performance, and companion. Many believe that these principles of sportsmanship are the prime reason why our sport has thrived for over one hundred years. With the belief that it is useful to periodically articulate the fundamentals of our sport, this code is presented.

Sportsmen respect the history, traditions and integrity of the sport of purebred dogs.

Sportsmen commit themselves to values of fair play, honesty, courtesy, and vigorous competition, as well as winning and losing with grace.

Sportsmen refuse to compromise their commitment and obligation to the sport of purebred dogs by injecting personal advantage or consideration into their decisions or behavior.

The sportsman judge judges only on the merits of the dogs and considers no other factors.

The sportsman judge or exhibitor accepts constructive criticism.

The sportsman exhibitor declines to enter or exhibit under a judge where it might reasonably appear that the judge's placements could be based on something other than the merits of the dogs.

The sportsman exhibitor refuses to compromise the impartiality of a judge.

The sportsman respects the AKC bylaws, rules, regulations and policies governing the sport of purebred dogs.

Sportsmen find that vigorous competition and civility are not inconsistent and are able to appreciate the merit of their competition and the effort of competitors.

Sportsmen welcome, encourage and support newcomers to the sport.

Sportsmen will deal fairly with all those who trade with them.

Sportsmen are willing to share honest and open appraisals of both the strengths and weaknesses of their breeding stock.

Sportsmen spurn any opportunity to take personal advantage of positions offered or bestowed upon them.

Sportsmen always consider as paramount the welfare of their dog.

Sportsmen refuse to embarrass the sport, the American Kennel Club, of themselves while taking part in the sport.

This and That

Planning ahead? The Westminster KC show will be held at Madison Square Garden on February 11 and 18 in 2008. Dr. J. Donald Jones will be judging Best In Show at this 132nd Annual event. Mr. Stanley S. Saltzman will judge the Herding Group, and Mr. Charles Trotter will judge Shetland Sheepdogs.

DOG NEWS notes that in 2009, Westminster KC has lost its usual Monday and Tuesday dates to the Grammy Award Ceremonies that will take place in Madison Square Garden, so the Westminster KC show will be on Tuesday and Wednesday, February 24 and 25, 2009.

Shetland Sheepdogs were first exhibited at Westminster in 1927. Since that time, Shelties have placed 16 times in the groups: Group I - four times in the Herding Group, and once in the Working Group. Group II - twice in the Herding Group. Group III - Three times in the Herding Group, and once in the Working Group. Group IV - Six times in the Working Group. (David Frei's article in DOG NEWS)

AKC NEWS

At its June meeting in Las Vegas, the AKC Delegate Body passed a resolution opposing California AB 1634 (which would require all dogs and cats over the age of four months to be spayed or neutered unless the owners qualify for and obtain an intact animal permit). The following is the resolution issued:

"Be it resolved that the Delegates of the American Kennel Club declare that the enactment of AB1634 in the State of California would

- 1) be detrimental to the sport of purebred dogs;
- 2) fail to achieve the humane results it purports to espouse; and
- 3) cost the State of California and its communities tens of millions of dollars in lost revenues.

"Be it further resolved that the Delegates of the American Kennel Club urge the Governor, the Senate and the Assembly of the State of California to defeat AB1634."

AKC President and CEO Dennis Spring said, "We are deeply concerned about the problems irresponsible dog owners, irresponsible breeding, and inadequate animal control can cause a community; however, mandatory spaying and neutering has proved to be an ineffective solution because it fails to address the heart of the issue--irresponsible ownership. The AKC and its clubs support non-discriminatory, fair, effective and enforceable legislation that addressed the pertinent animal issues in the community." (via AKC press release)

AKC is presently forming a Political Action Committee (PAC) which should give AKC another tool for battling the continuing threat of anti-dog laws. (via DOG NEWS)

The AKC has announced the panel of judges se-

lected for the Seventh Annual AKC/Eukanuba National Championship to be held December 1 and 2, 2007, which will once again showcase the nation's top AKC and international dogs as well as the popular Bred-by-Exhibitor competition. Maxine V. Beam will judge Best In Show, and Frak Sabella will judge Best Bred-by-Exhibitor in Show. Irene Biven will judge the Herding Group, Luis Miguel V. Pito Teixeira (from Portugal) will judge the BBE Herding Group, and Murrel Purkhiser will judge Shetland Sheepdogs.

A new feature this year will be an International competition where the top winning dogs from forty countries will be invited all expenses paid (for two persons) to compete. This competition will be called "The Eukanuba World Challenge," and these invited winners can also participate in the regular competition. (via D, The Dog News Magazine, and DOG NEWS)

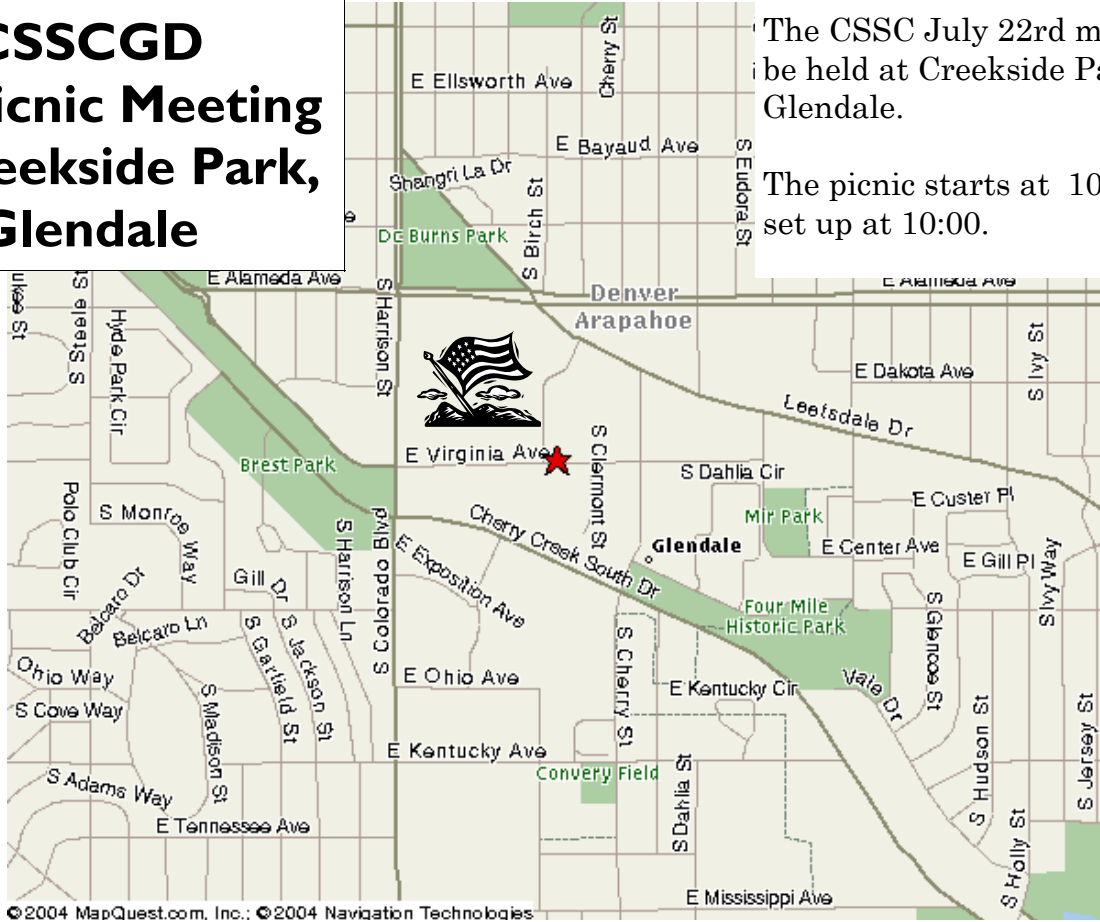
